Good morning, dearest Community and Friends!

What is the "secrets" of being a successful believer as an Old Catholic? What makes it work? We are only successful, and thus prophetic in our witness, if our Old Catholic Christian faith is a framework for our lives and actions. I have seven "secrets" that come to mind easily. See if these seven secrets apply:

Successful Old Catholics stay close to the Eucharist. Without the Sunday Eucharist in their lives, these individuals feel impoverished, isolated, empty. They are members of a faith community; they know they need the company of others on their life journey toward God. They rely on their conscience and good judgment—but never alone; life is a pilgrimage, not a prepackaged trip. They regularly do things that call them out of themselves—ministry, or some volunteer effort. They live in the moment, recognizing daily opportunities for holiness, and they use their sacramental imagination to discover God in everyday events.

Successful Old Catholics always remember that God, Who Is Love, is ever merciful and always forgiving; they are no strangers to self-reflection: they recognize all too well their shortcomings and fallibility, but they are confident that no matter how miserably they have behaved, they can never, ever exile themselves beyond the reach of God's love. They believe in prayer and pray regularly. Whatever their spirituality, successful Old Catholics consider prayer crucial to their very fiber and well-being.

Life is not easy, God only knows. There are so many decisions to make and problems to solve. Am I fair, honest and unifying at

work, in my home, in my parish community? Do I balance love, expectation and discipline? Do I both affirm and challenge my friends? Do I truly know that God's love has saved me. Bu that is only the beginning; I need to know how to live. May I have God's grace for wisdom that I may find the secrets to a successful life of Christian love.

U.S. Church Foundations Shaking

Gallup poll results released March 25 showed that church attendance has generally been on the decline since 2009, when 42% of respondents said they had attended a service in the past week. After 2009, attendance rates have mostly been in the 30s, with only two exceptions: 40% attendance in 2012 and 29% attendance in 2021.

Post-pandemic church attendance rates declined more sharply among Catholics than it did among Protestants. The 2016-2019 average among Catholics was 37%, compared with a 2020-2023 average of only 30%. Protestants in the same time frame fell from 44% to 40%.

Church attendance was at its height in the mid- to late-1950s. The highest points were 49% in 1955 and 49% again in 1958.

The number of U.S. nuns and sisters has plummeted to fewer that 42,000 in 2022 representing a 76% decline since 1972. The average age of U.S. nuns is 80 with less than 1% is under the age of 40.
